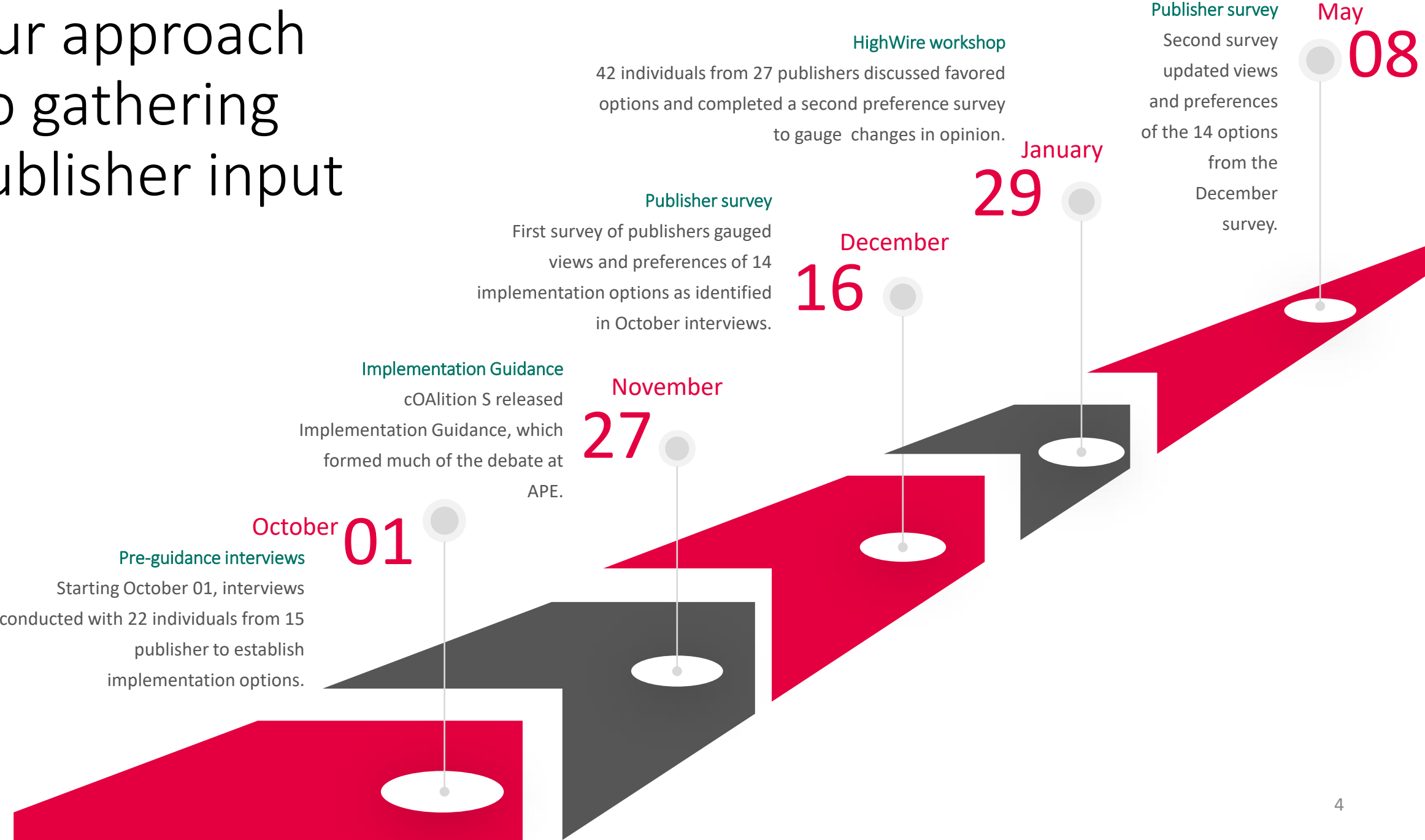

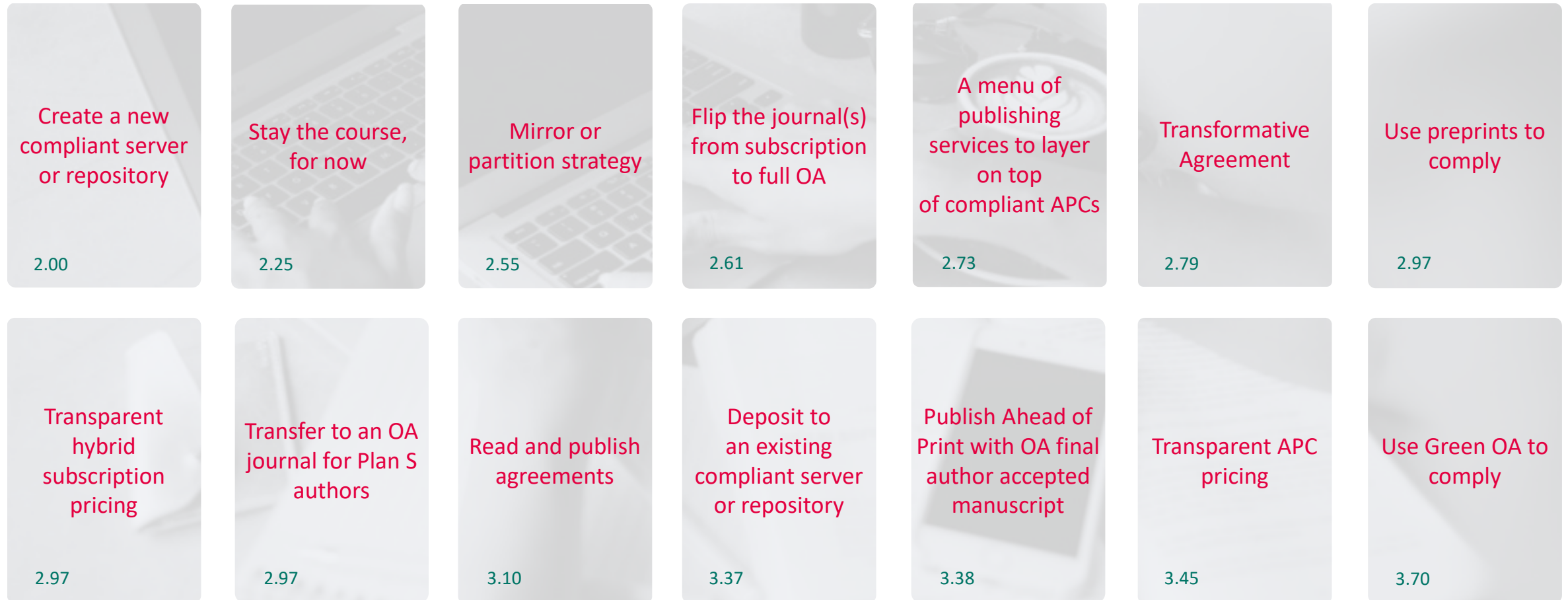

The 14 implementation options considered

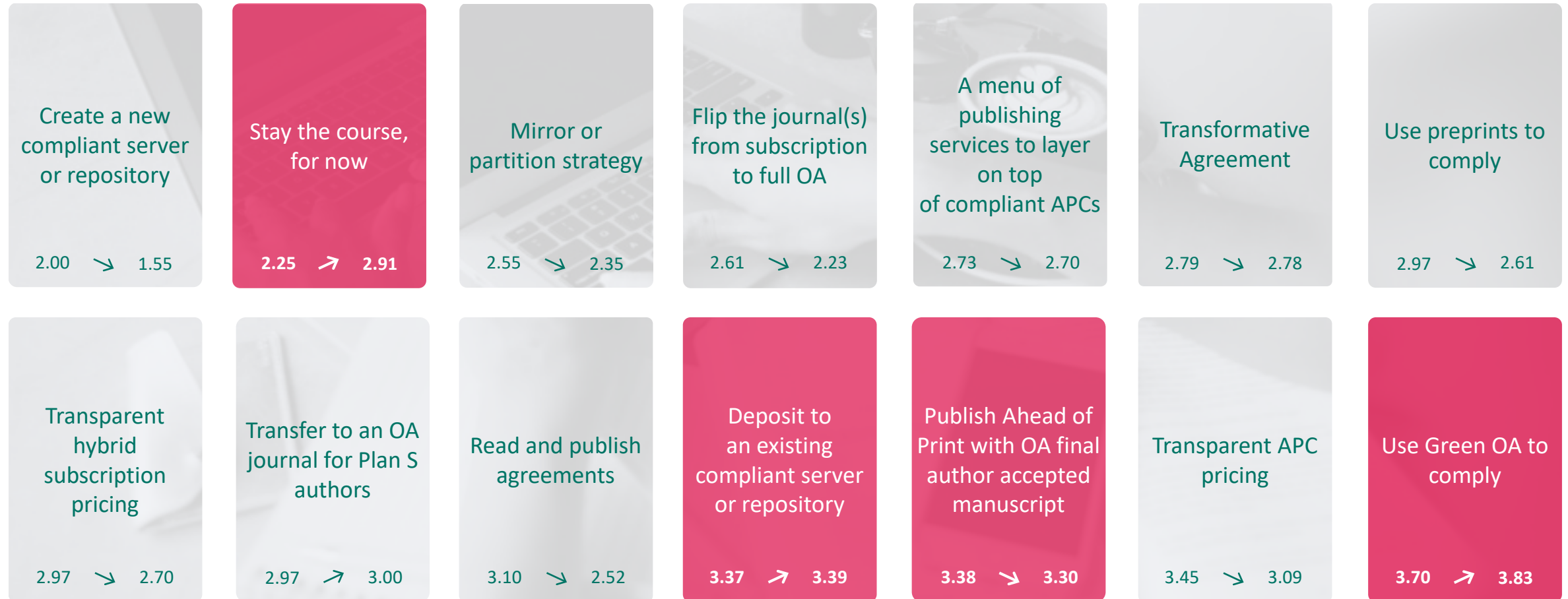
The scores reflect the publishers' preference for the option based on the December 16th survey.

The second score is from the post workshop January 29th survey.

The scores reflect the changing views as more clarification is issued and the impact of the options is better understood.



Independent-Publisher Response Evolves

October 2018

1. Use Green OA to comply.
2. Transparent APC pricing.
3. Post OA Author-Accepted Manuscript.
4. Deposit to an existing compliant server or repository.

5. Read and publish agreements.

6. Transfer to an OA journal.

7. Transparent hybrid subscription pricing.

8. Use preprints to comply.

9. Transformative agreement.

10. For-fee optional publishing services on top of "basic APC".

11. Flip journals to OA.

12. Mirror or partition strategy.

13. "Just Say No".

14. Create a new compliant server or repository.

<p>Authors publish in a Plan S compliant Open Access journal or on a Plan S compliant Open Access platform with a CC BY license.</p>	<p>Immediately upon publication, authors deposit the final published version of a scholarly publication (Version of Record (VoR)) or an Author's Accepted Manuscript (AAM), in a Plan S compliant repository. The document is made available immediately open access (with no embargo) under a CC BY license.</p>	<p>Authors publish Open Access with a CC BY license in a subscription journal that is covered by a transformative agreement that has a clear and time-specified commitment to a full Open Access transition.</p>

The Panelists' Principle Choices

- ASPET: Green OA via AAM on publisher site
- RUP: Green OA via authors' own deposit actions
- AJNR: Green OA via AAM on PMC
- ASCE: Stay the Course, for now
- ASM: Green OA deposits allowed
- AAAS: Exploring green OA zero-day embargo
- COB: *coming up next!*
- BMJ: *and next!*
- Brill: *and next!*

Where is Society/NFP/Medium-sized Publishers now?

- Less of a sense of alarm and panic, more of a sense of planning
- Plan S has to fit in to overall business plans/directions
 - Perhaps because number of Coalition S funders hasn't much increased
 - China and US unlikely to sign on
- Getting ahead of governance groups, before they get in front of publishing executives
 - What evidence do they need?
 - Commission consultants to model scenarios, etc.
- Zero-embargo green OA seems generally ok
 - Questions: who deposits? AAM?
- "Transformative agreements" still puzzling for NFPs
 - How? collaborations? Model agreements?

What has changed in the new Guidance?

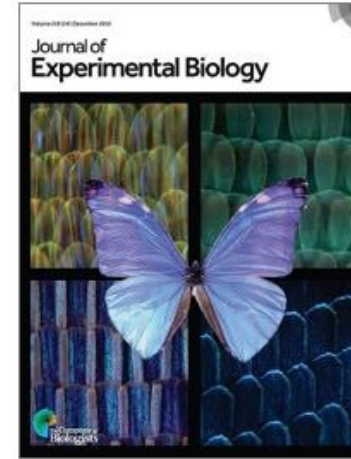
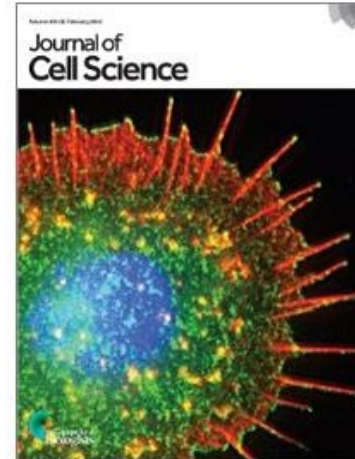
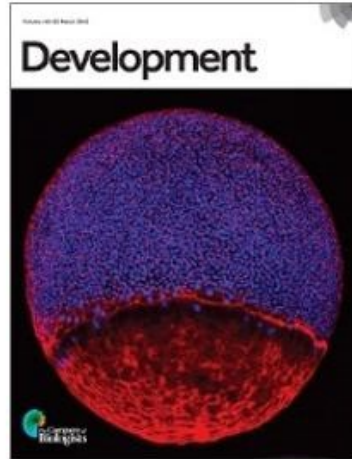
- Date for action: a year later
- Explicit “Rationale” for changes
- Concept of “transformative *journals*” is new, still fixed date
- Repository requirements relaxed
- ND (not NC) available by exception
- Clarified green route for authors
- Clarified green route can be paid APC but not by Coalition S
- ESAC rules require transparency and registration of deal parameters
- Research assessment (DORA) now a principle – to aid ECRs?
- No APC cap
- APC element transparency

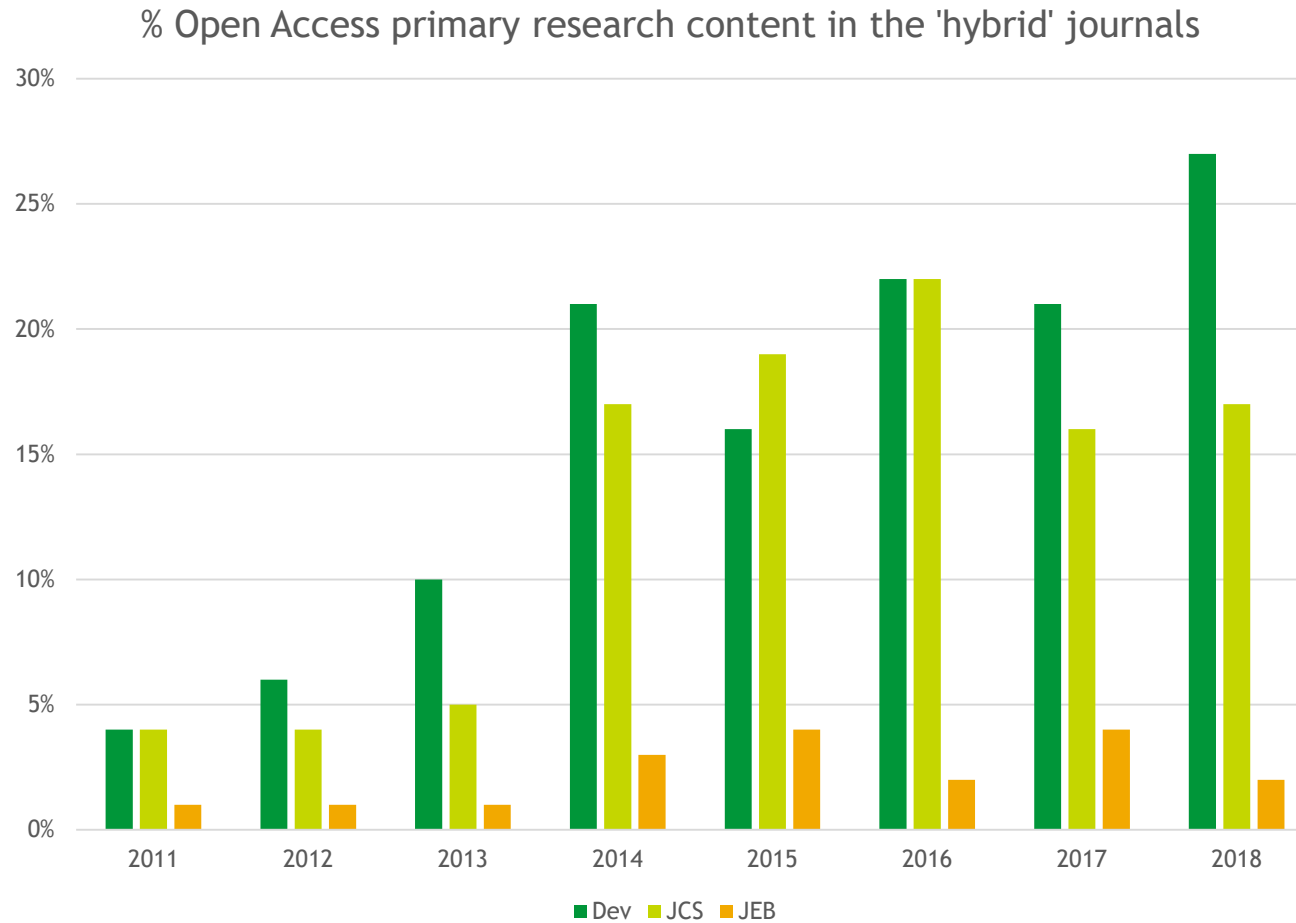

- I am on the Board of AIP Publishing

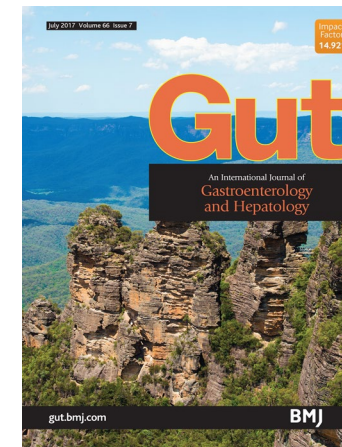
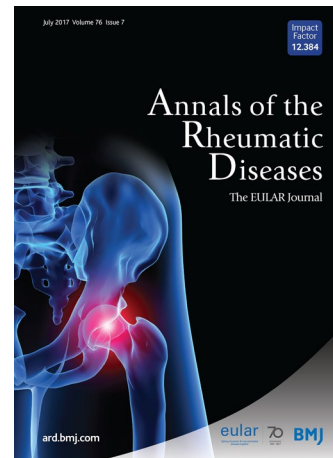

BMJ journals portfolio is very diverse

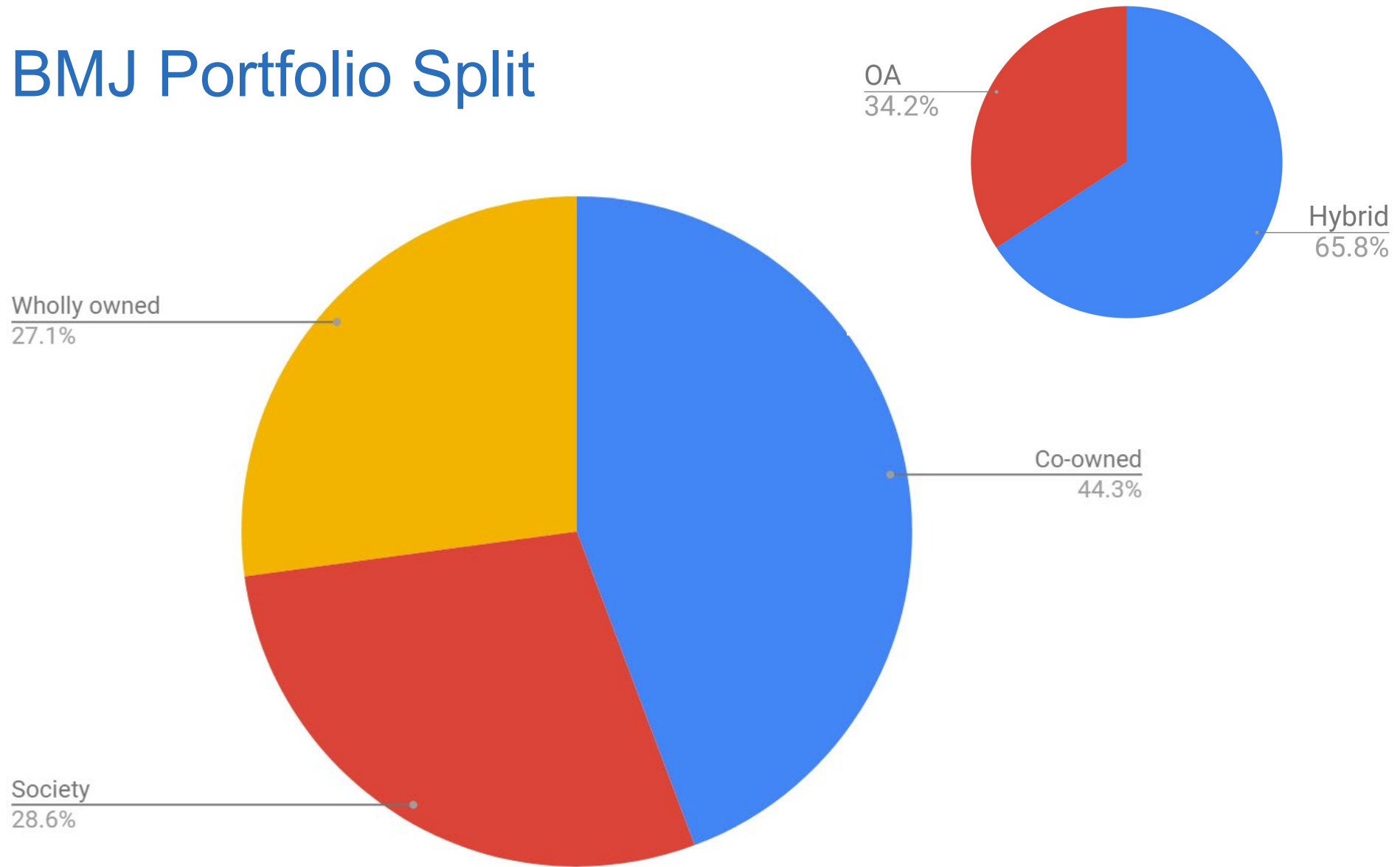

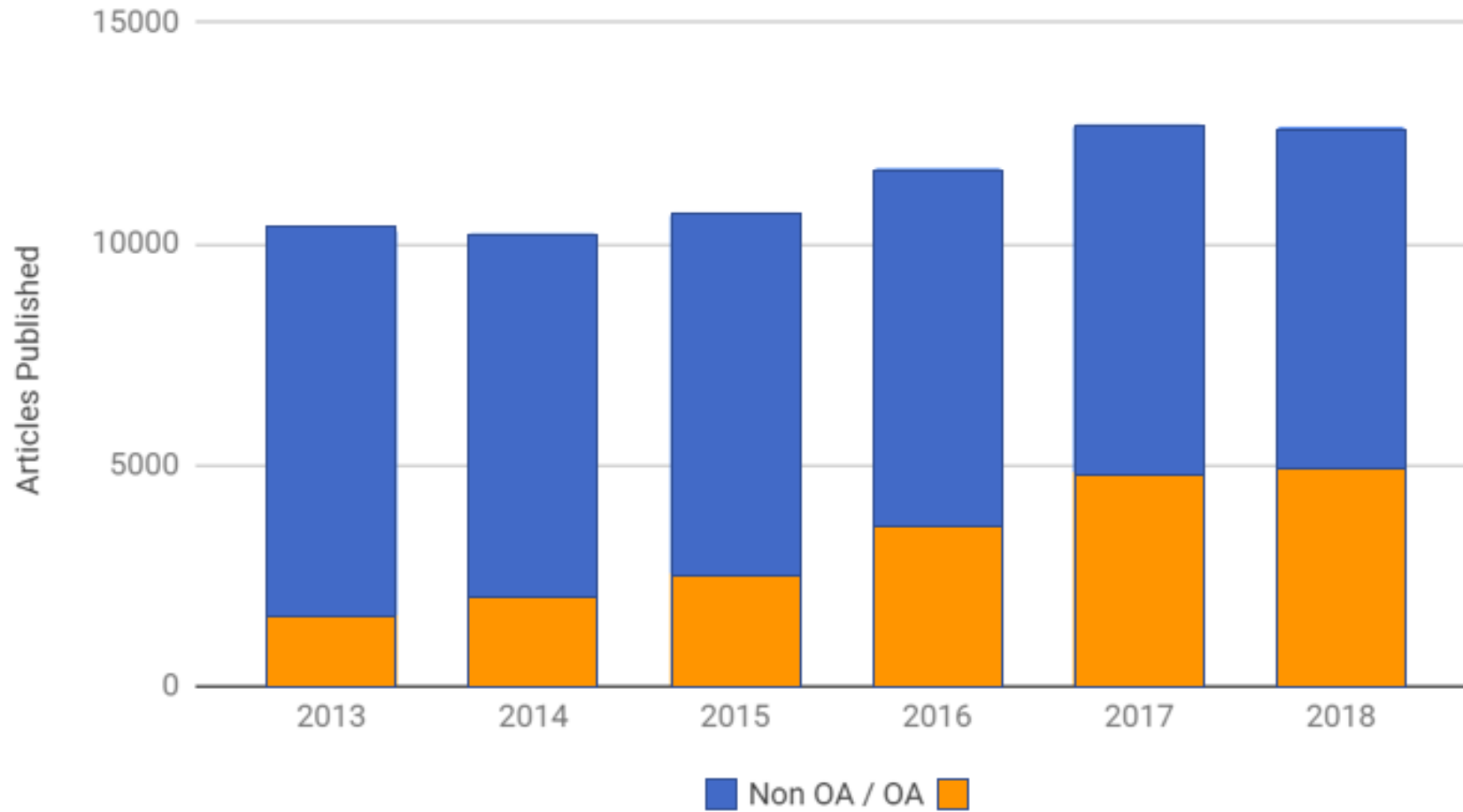
Open Access companion journals (not mirrors)



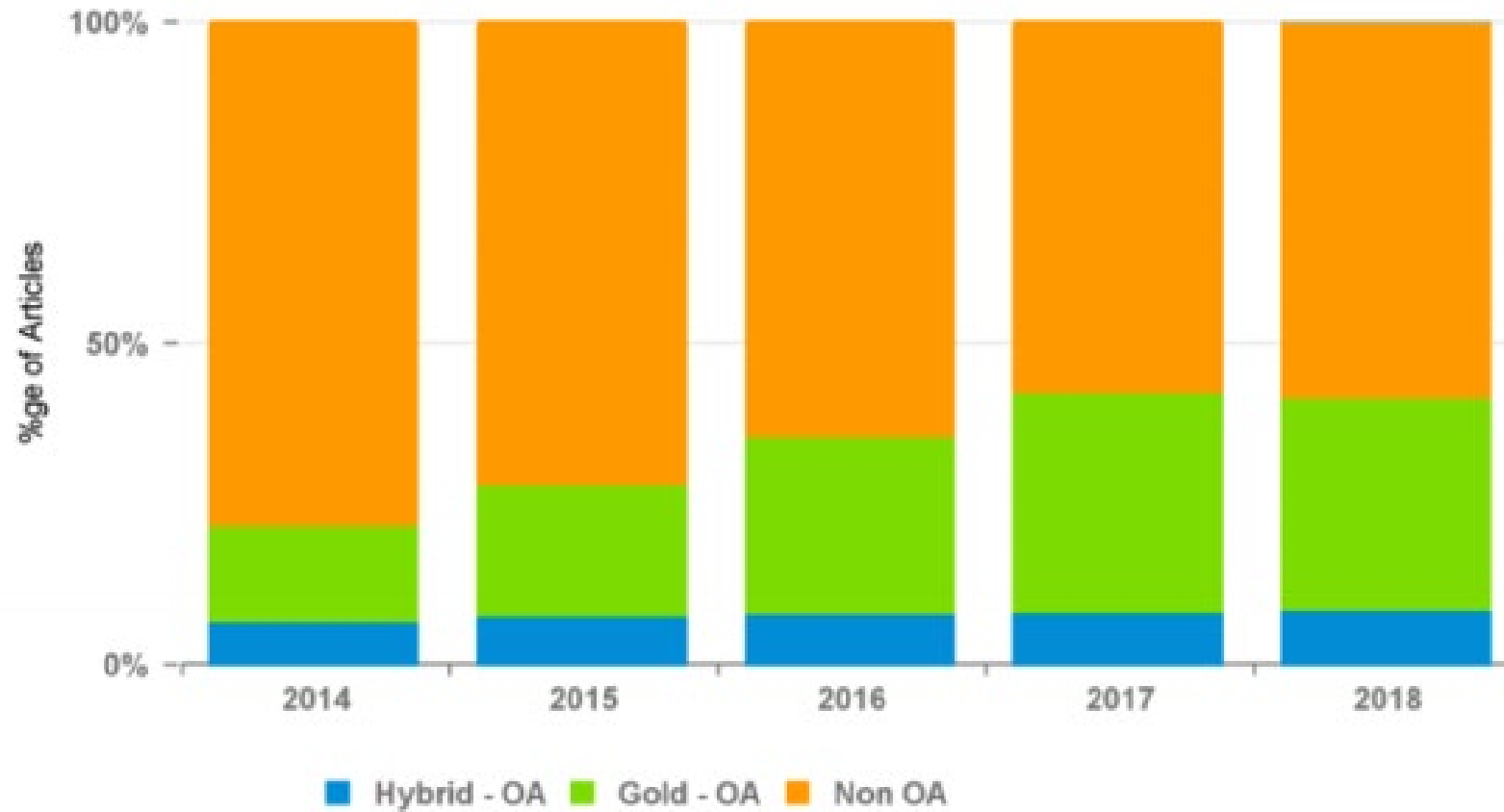
BMJ Portfolio Split

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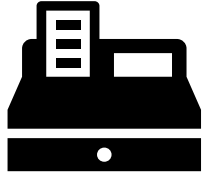

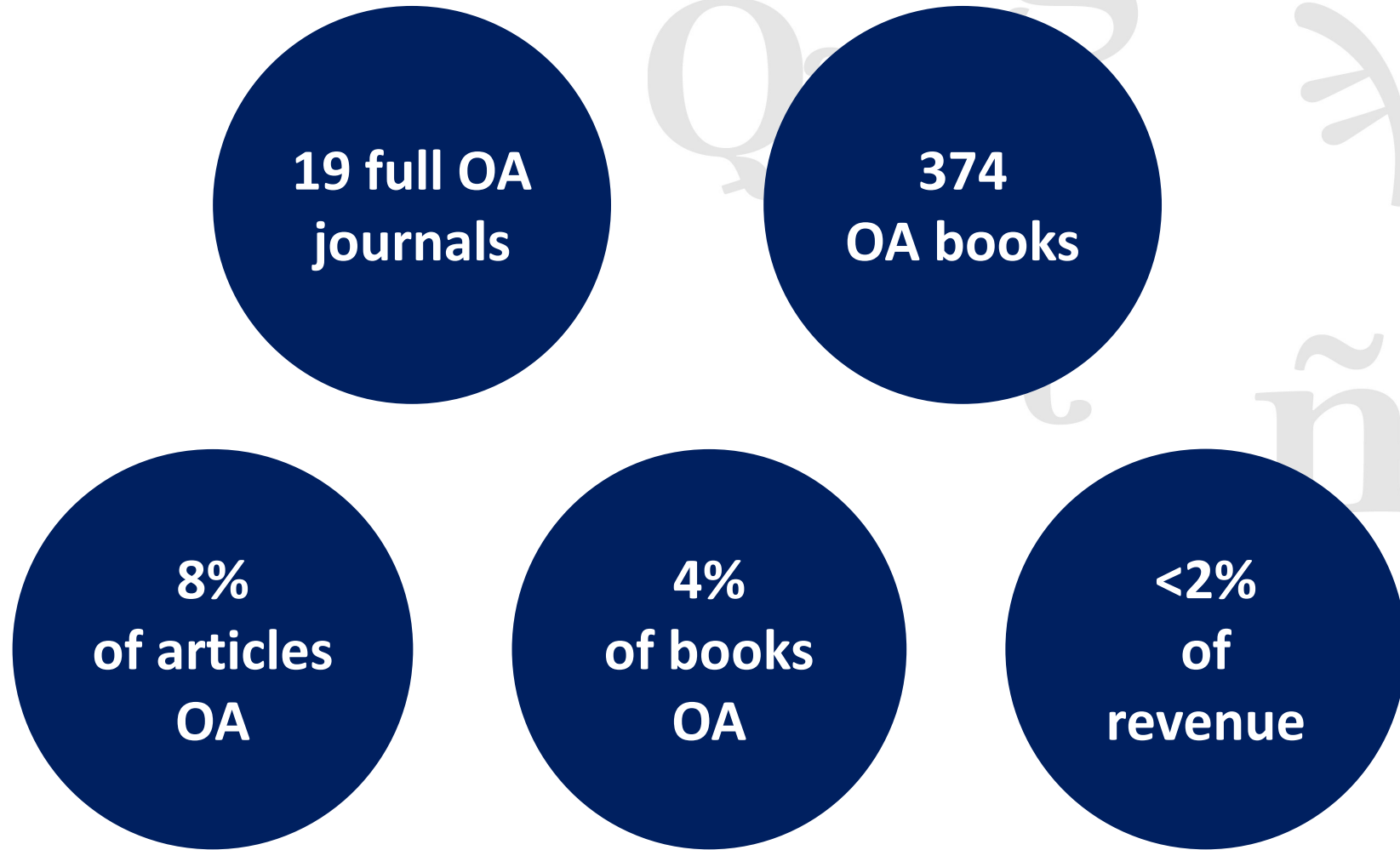

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An HSS Perspective on Plan S

This is an open letter to all funding agencies, government bodies and institutions that support Plan S. It is written from the perspective of publishers working across the humanities and social sciences (HSS) and will be submitted to the open consultation of cOAlition S. This letter does not represent a comprehensive critique of the recently published guidelines. In the past few weeks, the research community has offered detailed analysis and feedback on the guidelines and we share many of the concerns.^[1] This letter focuses on the unintended consequences and deleterious impact of applying a model designed for STM journals to all humanities and social science disciplines. It also offers ideas for a collaborative way forward.

Plan B(rill)

1. Green OA is an intermediary solution.
2. Support innovative models that help shift subscription money to OA.
3. Encourage transformative agreements with smaller publishers.
4. Allow hybrid but only for journals with a transparent and fair policy to avoid double dipping.
5. CC-BY is not always the most suitable license for HSS.
6. Involve experienced publishers in developing sustainable policies for monographs.

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
